Lineham, 528 West North street, His death was due to the infirmity of age, but probably hastened by the shock of a fall in his home about six weeks age, He did not suffer from the fall more than the shock. After that accident he was confined to his bed but remained fully conscious until Monday. mained fully conscious until Monday, after which time there were only conscious moments of consciousness.

John Cassell was born Cct. 26, 1828, in Harrisburg, Pa. His father, Wil-liam Cassell, brought his family to Dam Cassell, brought his family to Himols in 1839. Their first stop in Himols was in Decatur, because they were snowbound, the plan having been to go further north in the state. Often recounting his coming to Decatur he told that the family, traveling in covered wagons, camped in what now is Lincoln square.
